## **KEHA Annual Meeting**



## Support an Alzheimer's Caregiver

According to the Alzheimer's Association, 81,000 Kentuckians aged 65 and older live with Alzheimer's disease. To help them with care needs, 157,000 family caregivers spend millions of hours providing unpaid care. The Alzheimer's Association encourages ways to support an Alzheimer's caregiver. Alzheimer's care can be increasingly demanding as each stage imposes different responsibilities and stresses. Alzheimer's caregivers can commonly feel despair, fatigue, and loneliness. According to the Alzheimer's Association, you can support an Alzheimer's caregiver by doing one or more of the following suggestions.

- Learning. Learning about the disease so you know what to expect and when to appropriately offer help.
- Build a Care Team. Help organize friends, families, and neighbors who want to help.
- Provide Respite. Offer to spend time with the person with AD to give the caregiver a break.
- Check-in/Be Present. Send a text or make a call just to say hi. Feeling supported feels good and helps battle loneliness and isolation.
- Offer Specific Help. Helping a caregiver cross off items on the to-do list provides relief.
   It is rare that a caregiver will ask for help, so just do it! (Walk the dog, run an errand, mow the lawn.)
- Help During the Holidays or other Busy Times. Offer to help cook, clean, wrap presents,
- Join the Fight. Get involved with the Alzheimer's Association, local walks, volunteer, join the Sanders-Brown Center for Aging.
- Praise a Caregiver. When a caregiver is doing a nice job, tell them!
